The lease on the allotments has passed the final LBTH hurdle and is now on the home straight along with our move to a Co operative Society. It has been a long road and involved jumping over many hurdles, searching endless records and many detailed discussions, but we now can stop looking backwards and start to embrace our secured future.

As more flats get built less green space exists and fewer folk have any space to garden. Fresh vegetables and fruit has never been in such demand and home grown trumps supermarket hands down. Today we have over 150 on the waiting list for what are 95 plots. Interest in and enthusiasm in growing and is higher than ever. We are also extending the activities of the allotments with our very active community outreach programme.

We have renovated the old rusted steel shipping container on the Lower plots creating a weatherproof and fully insulated cabin to be proud of. We have revived the barren borders of the pavilion and thanks to Tatiana have stocked them with foliage and colour. The memorial gardens continue to come back to life and the upper garden strip was an abundance of bloom this summer. But there is much more we can do on the land, to further improve communications and involving the wider community and waiting list.

I am pleased to say that we have now got an equitable and productive and growing relationship with the Farm which has already reaped benefits. This can only continue to develop as we embark on joint projects and community work.

The Container Refurbishment

After being left to rust and used as a junk store the old Trading Shed shipping container on the Lower plots has been refurbished. Some said it couldn't be done but with sponsorship from Canary Wharf Group and Royal Warrant Holder's Charity Trust it now has; a new roof, guttering, insulation inside and out, half round cladding outside and 18mm plywood lining inside and a lick of paint. It even has shelving given to us from Trinty Buoy Wharf and is now ready to be used, but more of that later.
